APIARY NOTES - Tim Bullock (Chair)

The weather has been quite varied recently and the forecast says it should be bright but not particularly warm for the rest of March, so I wouldn't be in any hurry to start inspections yet. If you do, make sure it is warm day and you are fast – the last thing you want to do is chill any brood. Nectar supplies are limited at the moment so keep feeding fondant, if they don't need it they are very unlikely to take it down and fill cells with it, whereas as syrup can soon be taken down and put in cells that queens could be laying into.

When we do get to the point of making regular inspections, it's always best to have a plan before you start each inspection – what do you want to know, what are you looking for etc. as this will help to speed you up.

The main key things to check: - is there enough food (colonies can still starve at this time of year especially if the weather turns cold), is the queen laying well (and does the brood pattern look good), any sign of disease.

Colonies hopefully won't be starting to make swarm preparations yet, but if we get a good warm spell in early April it could happen so now is the time to make sure you're ready for when they do. Spare hives/nucs, bait hives etc. etc. As April progresses brood boxes fill and get more congested, then colonies may start to swarm. Once the weather warms up properly and things get going don't forget to check for swarm cells and play cups hidden away in corners and hard to get to places. Asian hornet queens are likely to be out starting to build their first nests at some point in April – again, something that is weather dependent. Consider putting out hornet traps baited either with hornet bait or something sweet (beer, fruit etc.). Check regularly and release any catch that isn't an Asian hornet.

During the warm spell of March I checked the fondant supplies and watched the entrances of the hive and nuc at Park Farm. Pollen Candi was added to the nuc. It was noticed that the bees in the nuc were very active collecting nectar but in the main hive there was no activity. Unfortunately after lifting the crown board I could see no bees and I then lifted the bottom box off to reveal a lot of dead bees on the mesh floor. As this hive was not treated this could have been caused by Chronic Bee Paralysis Virus caused by a Varroa overload, especially as there were a number of bald dead bees seen on the floor.
